[Good Dog, Bad Food: Foods for People That Are Bad for Your Dog | FDA](#)

If you consider the family dog, well, *family*—and are apt to toss him a piece of your food now and then—proceed with caution. Some foods meant for human consumption can be dangerous, and even deadly, to your dog.

How are people and animals different when it comes to food? According to Carmela Stamper, D.V.M., a veterinarian at the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), an animal's body processes food much differently. "Our bodies may break down foods or other chemicals that a dog's can't tolerate," she says.

And while sometimes people can have severe allergic reactions to foods, it's different for dogs. "Allergies in animals tend to manifest themselves more in skin or ear issues," she explains.

Moreover, a food might harm one dog and not another. It depends on a number of factors, including the animal's genetic makeup and size, as well as the amount that animal eats. "A big lab that eats a bar of dark chocolate may not have any problems," she says, whereas a Chihuahua could get dangerously ill.

What Foods Top the List?

"In summer, be particularly careful of foods eaten at picnics and barbecues," Stamper says. Among the foods you want to withhold from your dog are:

- **Raw meat**, which can contain *E. coli*, *Salmonella*, or other harmful bacteria. If you're making hamburger patties or setting out steaks and chicken breasts for the barbecue, for instance, make sure they're well out of reach of your counter-surfing canines; you're not doing them any favors by tossing a chunk or two. "Food safety is important to you and your pet," Stamper cautions. Don't handle raw meat and then give your dog a treat unless you've washed your hands first. And remember it works the other way around, too. "People can get sick after handling contaminated dog food, not washing their hands, and then using their hands to eat a sandwich or a slice of pizza," Stamper says.
- **Grapes, raisins, and currants** can cause kidney failure in some dogs. Stamper says not all dogs are affected, but if you think you're handing your dog a healthy snack, you could be disastrously wrong. But what about other fruits? For instance, can dogs eat apples and bananas? Stamper says yes—just make sure that with apples, you don't feed your dog the core or seeds.
- **Fried and fatty foods** can not only give your dog a stomach ache, but can also cause a potentially life-threatening disease called pancreatitis. Even if your dog is eyeing the fried chicken with longing, resist the temptation to give him his own piece to chew on.
- **Moldy foods** are not something you would feed your family, and your dog shouldn't eat them either. If you put moldy cheese rinds or hamburger buns in the trash can, make sure your dog doesn't then get into the garbage. By the same token, if you have a compost heap and it's the first place your dog makes a beeline for, be sure the moldy scraps are well out of reach.
- **Onions, garlic, and chives** (as well as onion and garlic powder) can be harmful to your dog, especially in large amounts. If you've put a lot of onions and garlic powder in your salsa, marinade, or beans, don't let your dog get into the leftovers.
- **Salty snacks, in large quantities**, could also cause problems in your dog. "Feeding the odd potato chip or pretzel probably won't do any harm," Stamper says. But if your dog gets into a whole bag of them, he could get really sick. Make sure your dog has access to plenty of water at all times, especially if he gets into salty snacks.

Calling all Sniffers – CNE will be holding a first ever CKCSC USA Scent Work Trial. The dates are November 11, 12 & 13, 2022 at the Clarion Inn Event Center, Frederick, MD. We are planning to offer Novice A & B classes in all four (4) elements—Containers, Interior, Exterior and Buried Hide, as well as Handler Discrimination. Since we are offering a three day trial, you can obtain a Title, if your dog qualifies all three days. We are also offering a “High In Trial” Award each day. See the Premium for more information. This performance event was started recently by the AKC and has become very popular in the dog world. All dogs use their noses every day of their lives, so why not give them a job that they love—sniffing. We’ve seen the great accomplishments of the Search and Rescue dogs on the news since 9-11; now you can put your Cavalier’s natural talents to work in a whole new performance event—Scent Work. This is a sport that mimics the task of working detection dogs to locate a scent and communicate

to the handler that the scent has been found. The scent work is broken down into two divisions. The Odor Search Division, in which the dog is searching for the odor of one or more specific essential oils—Birch, Anise and/or Clove—and the Handler Discrimination Division in which the dog is searching for the scent of their handler. Searches are completed in a variety of environments known as “Elements.” They are as follows:-- 1 Container: The target odor is concealed within a container, such as cardboard boxes or briefcases, and the dog must indicate in which container the scent is hidden. 2 Interior: The target odor is concealed on or in an object in an indoor search area. 3 Exterior: The target odor is concealed on or in an object in an outdoor search area—this requires the dog to locate the scent despite changing airflow patterns, weather conditions and natural distractions. 4 Buried: The target odor is concealed within a small container and then buried beneath sand or water .



Continued from P 9. Each element in the Odor Search Division and the Handler Discrimination Division has four (4) difficulty of levels—Novice, Advanced, Excellent and Master. Scent Work is a terrific sport because you don't necessarily have to take classes to become ready to compete at trial. And because the searches mimic real-life scenarios, training can be done at home or in the community. There are many books and videos to help you get your dog started in Scent Work. 

WHAT I WISH PEOPLE LOOKING FOR CAVALIERS UNDERSTOOD

Or *Cavalier Research 101*

When people are looking for a job, the first piece of advice given to them is to research the company they're applying to and learn as much about it as possible about it before their interview. If I could advise people who are looking for a Cavalier, the first thing I would tell them is exactly the same: learn as much as you can about the breed. Start with the basics—**know the name of the breed before you call breeders**. Calling a breeder and asking about a King Charles Spaniel, a King Charles Cavalier, a *Prince* Charles Spaniel, a brown and white King Charles and so on is not going to impress a breeder. “Do you have any Cava-Poos?” might actually invite an irritated response; good breeders don't have anything to do with mixed breeds. With all of the information available at our fingertips today, there is no excuse for not knowing the name of the breed, their basic temperament, or not knowing a Cava-Poo is a “Designer Breed”, also known as a mixed breed or a mutt.

Your follow-up is just as important as your initial contact. If you contact someone by email and they respond, **read their entire email**. Many breeders, if they do not have puppies available or arriving soon, might suggest some websites that are sponsored by breed clubs like the www.eastcoastcavalierbreeders.com for example. I always suggest our National Club's website, www.ckcsc.org (*Cavalier King Charles Spaniel Club, USA*) and tell them that along with some valuable information, the website lists breeders by state. Since I live in New York, I can't possibly know breeders in Paduca, KY or in Bar Harbor, Maine. Yet invariable I get an email or a call back asking if I know any breeders in Kentucky, Maine, California, or Alaska. Any website suggested to you by a responsible breeder will be a valuable resource. Take advantage of it.

“How do I know I'm speaking with a responsible breeder?” you may ask. A responsible breeder will belong to a breed club, attend their functions and show their dogs at CKCSC, USA or AKC shows. The purpose of the Dog Show is for breeders to compare their dog to other dogs in the breed standard. They are not breeding just to make money selling puppies. They will perform the important health testing on the parents of their puppies before breeding. In Cavaliers,

SWEEPS 1: JUNIOR PUPPY DOG (4)

1. GRANASIL STRUDEL OF SUMARA (Gentil)

Lovely and well-balanced Black and Tan boy with excellent head carriage and beautiful coat for a boy his age. Beautiful expression with dark eyes and a soft yet masculine head piece. His lay of shoulder and swan-like neck made him stand out above the rest in his class.

2. FALLING SPRINGS JUST YOU WAIT AT CROWNROSE (Rosenberg/Rosenberg)

Well-broken Blenheim boy who showed adoringly for his handler. Beautiful dark, round eyes and masculine head piece.

3. REX DOBRY ROK (Brynjarsdottir)

Blenheim boy with a lovely shaped head piece. Moved with confidence around the ring.

4. SHERAH TOUCHED BY AN ANGEL (Crommett)

Lovely Blenheim boy with a luscious well-conditioned coat. With more experience in the show ring, he will build confidence so that he can adequately show off his gait and movement with the characteristic Cavalier tail-wag.

SWEEPS 2: SENIOR PUPPY DOG (1)

1. KENJOCKETY UNDER PRESSURE (Weber/Weber)

Well-balanced Blenheim boy with good movement due to his great rear angulation. Front angulation did not quite match the rear, but he was able to compensate and move freely around the ring.

SWEEPS 3: GRADUATE PUPPY DOG (3)

1. FALLING SPRINGS RAMBLIN GAMBLIN MAN, JW (Grimm Curley)

Well-broken Tricolor boy with ample cushion around the eyes that contributes to his sweet expression. Great lay of shoulder that gives him a swan-like neck and excellent head carriage. In this tough class, this boy ultimately won out because of his compactness and head carriage. Though he was a little underweight at this show, I could not deny him **BEST PUPPY DOG IN**

SWEEPSTAKES.

2. FORESTCREEK MAJOR TOM (Cline/Cline)

Beautiful Blenheim boy with a luscious, silky-straight coat. Somewhat hard to track his movement and longer cast than first place. He is very mature for his age, which made him look a little out of place in the puppy class but he will fit right in once he moves on to the adult classes.

3. LINRICA OVER THE MOON BABY (Liu)

Well-broken Blenheim boy with a rich chestnut coloring. Beautiful eyes and head piece with ample cushion. Had some confidence issues today that will hopefully shake out over time.

SWEEPS 4: JUNIOR PUPPY BITCH (8)

1. CHADWICK HALO SPOT (Eckersley)

Spunky Blenheim girl with a short back and cobby build. Great angulation with tight elbows and well let-down hocks. Her sweet expression and confidence in the ring helped her win the largest class of the evening!

2. LINRICA POEME D'AMOUR (Liu)

Pretty Tricolor girl with a sweet face and dark eyes. Lovely size and shape with great angles and a beautiful, shiny coat.

3. FALLING SPRINGS SHINING BRIGHTLY (Grimm Curley)
